od so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so everyone who believes in him might have eternal life."

It's much easier to say "I love you" than to do "I love you". Words are not enough to express the depth of what real love conveys. Love is an extension of self: giving self to the other, wishing all good for the other even when it costs us. When this kind of love occurs between two or more people, life is enlarged, persons are enlarged. When today's



Gospel declares that "God so loved the world", this is not a "saying" love but a "doing" love. God's love enlarges life beyond imagination to eternal life. God's love enlarges persons beyond

imagination to doing "works...in God".

Such depth of God's love this Gospel reveals: God gave the only Son, allowed the only Son to be "lifted up" on a cross, and now remains patient with us while we struggle with choosing between darkness and light, evil and truth. Moreover, in the very midst of our ongoing struggle, it is God who brings us to greater belief and leads us to eternal life. Such is the depth of love God has for us!

THE PRACTICE OF LENT

Praying with the Signs of the Times

In the powerful Vatican II document *Gaudium et Spes* (Pastoral Constitution on the Church in the Modern World), the Church affirms "that in every age, the Church

carries the responsibility of reading the signs of the times and of interpreting them in the light of the Gospel". As members of the Body of Christ, we too are called to



this same responsibility to learn to read the signs of the times: recognizing them, praying over them and discerning their meaning for us in light of the Gospel. It is critical that we understand the times and what needs to be done now.

Reading the signs of the times is a spiritual discipline that tries to shake off the dominant secular messages that surround us and focus on an alternate positive "Kairos" perspective as followers of Christ. Instead of what's wrong with the world, Kairos focuses on what is coming to fullness in the present moment, seeking to understand what's ripe and ready for justice; what fruit is ready to be harvested; what we can gleam from this field. Kairos thinking asks, what are the opportunities for an in-breaking of grace, for justice-making, for creativity and bold initiative in this situation? What can I support and assist in this? What is God doing and how am I called to be a partner? What possibilities are being born today in our community?

Blessed are you, Lord, Giver of all Gifts!


