

Easter time and displays them all over the house. There is even one in the bathroom.

Talk to your children (and everybody else) about the Easter Gift of Victory Over Sin and Death you have received. Tell them about the kind of victory Jesus accomplished: love over hate, giving over selfishness, peace over conflict, life over death. Believe! This is very good news! There really are other better ways of living and doing and being with each other. The fullness of life is possible. Easter has taught us. It already lives in each of us; and Jesus is with us on the way. SO, OFF WE GO!

We Remember! We Celebrate! We Believe!
