REFLECTION ON THE WORD

It's only been three days since the disciples have seen Jesus alive. But it must seem like an eternity to them. They are gathered behind locked doors. They are afraid. They are confused about what to do. So they stay put. They've lost the sense of confidence they had when Jesus was with them.



On Easter evening, the risen Jesus appears and shows the disciples "his hands and his side". It is Jesus who makes the first convincing move to enable the disciples to believe that he has truly risen from the dead. Whether we see clearly like the disciples gathered around the risen Jesus, or only through doubting like Thomas, the risen Jesus is always present in our midst removing all obstacles to belief.

Going from disbelief to belief is not a mental exercise. It is encountering the risen Lord in the people and circumstances around us. Believing is living faithfully the risen Life Jesus gives us.

Words to reflect upon: the risen Jesus is always present in our midst

Where there is fear I can allay, where there is pain I can heal, where there are wounds I can bind and hunger I can fill:
Lord, grant me courage;
Lord grant me strength;
Lord grant me compassion,
that I may be your heart today. Amen

There are Easter people among us today whose faithfulness inspires our own. They are the ones who trust the Spirit's presence, even in the midst of adversity. They are the ones who quietly feed the hungry, clothe the naked and shelter

the homeless and teach their children to do the same. They are also the ones who gather their families all over the Middle East in the face of approaching death and remind them that they are an Easter people.

We are all Easter people who believe that the cross transformed all suffering and pain, and the Resurrection




secured the promise of eternal life. It is this paschal mystery, **this Easter faith**, that we are called to live each day.

God works through us. God brings about salvation through us. His Mercy must be our mercy.

TODAY IS DIVINE MERCY SUNDAY, the Second Sunday of the **Easter Season**, the Sunday of renewed

encounter with the Resurrected Christ's mercy. Proclaimed by blessed John Paul II in 2000, this **Feast of Mercy** reminds us that we are not simply called to ask for God's mercy, we are also called to be merciful. So let us practice a mercy that is forgiving and true, forgiving our enemies and caring for the weary and vulnerable of our community wherever we encounter them in thanksgiving for the Divine Mercy we have received from the Risen Lord.



Easter is an invitation to radical change. Why? Because We Are An Easter People, that's why.

What then does it look like to be an Easter people?



How are we to live? When we start at the very beginning and search the Acts accounts of the Easter season

Scriptures, we learn how that very first community of Jesus' followers began to shape their priorities and create a way of life.

- 1. Within the early community, "there was no needy person among them" (Acts 4:34). Those who had more property and wealth liquidated their assets and gave the money to the apostles to distribute to those in need...startling news to our 21st century selves, but true nonetheless.
- 2. The Spirit was at work among them and they came to believe that radical change is the sure sign of the work of the Spirit of Jesus. (Acts 9:27)
- 3. They understood that God truly shows no partiality among humankind. (Acts 10:34) All are equal in the sight of God.
- 4. Finally, there was a clear message on that Ascension day that **Easter people** do not dawdle looking up at the sky but **must live as active witnesses to faith** wherever they are. (Acts 1:11)
