

ent, **Easter** and Pentecost are powerful seasons at the center of our Christian life and liturgical celebration. They are also powerful seasons of the human heart. Tuning into these seasons, with all their symbols, meanings and emotions, can shape our lives and the practice of our faith for a lifetime...

So let us live every one of the 50 days of the **Easter Season** that culminate in the Great Feast of Pentecost with the genuine enthusiasm of a truly **Easter People**. The Good News is really and truly GOOD NEWS!

Remember! Open your heart. Celebrate Jesus' victory over death in a noisy, joyful way. Sing Alleluia over and over in your heart every day. Sing Alleluia aloud at least once every day. If you're new at this, try starting in the shower... Plan ways to continue celebrating Easter: emphasize light by using candles, bright colors, flowers, alleluia songs, smiling faces and any other sign of new life that appeals to your particular sensibility and life style. I know a woman who pulls out her collection of rabbit figures

every year at **Easter time** and displays them all over the house. There is even one in the bathroom.

Talk to your children (and everybody else) about the **Easter Gift** of <u>Victory Over Sin and Death</u> you have received. Tell
them about the kind of victory Jesus accomplished: love
over hate, giving over selfishness, peace over conflict,
life over death. **Believe!** This is very good news! There
really are other better ways of living and doing and being
with each other. The fullness of life is possible. **Easter** has
taught us. It already lives in each of us; and Jesus is with
us on the way. SO, OFF WE GO!

MERCY-ING

Some suggestions for keeping to mercy during this **Holy Year of Mercy:**

- Learn the Jesus prayer and use it. 'Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on me, a sinner.'
- Take a few minutes during the week to stop at a church and sit before the Tabernacle, simply to be with Christ, the Merciful. If you cannot do that, meditate upon the crucifix.
- Offer to read to someone who is feeling ill or is just feeling blue.
- Ask the Holy Spirit to groan for you when you cannot bring yourself to pray for someone who has done you an injury.

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This reminds me of the old Irish "prayer" that reads:

may God turn their ankles
so we'll know them
by their limping.

Second Reading Colossians 3:1-4

"Brothers and sisters: If then you were raised with Christ, seek what is above." Paul tells us what is "above" later in chapter 3 of Colossians. He says that we should put on heartfelt compassion. What
